MACOSS also facilitates its member organisations and strengthens their organizational capacity.



# ABOUT MACOSS

#### Background

The Mauritius Council of Social Service ('MACOSS') was founded in 1965 following a circular (No. 832/61) dated 17 July 1961 from the Secretary of State for the colonies. From a social service coordinating body in 1965, MACOSS has become today, The National Platform of Registered Non-Governmental Organisations ('NGOs') in Mauritius with a significant membership base.

MACOSS has a special and distinct status in Mauritius. It is an independent and objective organization and is the sole representative of NGOs/CSOs/NPOs (registered or not) in the country. International organisations and their emanations and/or organs do recognize the independent status of MACOSS. The views, opinion and position of MACOSS are the *de facto* independent and objective views of the civil society at large.

MACOSS is an independent body, sovereign from the government and any other legal or natural person.

#### **Establishment of the Council**

MACOSS, referred to as the 'Council', was incorporated by an act of Parliament in 1970, namely The Mauritius Council of Social Service Act 1970 (Act No.55 of 1970 - 9 December 1970 - hereinafter 'Act'). By virtue of Section 2 of the Act, MACOSS is a body corporate.

The Council, which is represented by the general assembly of members is the supreme organ of MACOSS. It regroups registered NGOs incorporated under the Registration of Associations Act 1978 or such specific NPOs, registered under different other legislations (Acts of Parliament).

#### **OBJECTS OF MACOSS**


The Objects are as per Section 4 of the MACOSS Act, as amended, reading as follow -

#### "4 Objects of the Council

- (1.) The objects of the Council shall be to
  - (a) promote any charitable purposes for the benefit of the community in Mauritius and, in particular, the advancement of social education, the furtherance of health and the relief of poverty, distress and sickness;
  - (b) promote and foster co-operation in the achievement of the purposes under paragraph (a) by bringing together representatives of the statutory bodies and voluntary organisations engaged in the furtherance of those purposes;
  - (c) do anything which is incidental or conducive to the attainment of those objects.
- (2) In particular but without prejudice to the generality of its objects under subsection (1) the Council shall endeavor to
  - (a) give financial or other assistance to any person;
  - (b) procure and provide information;
  - (c) procure to be written, and print, publish, issue and circulate reports, periodicals, books, leaflets or other documents;
  - (d) arrange and provide for, or join in arranging and providing for, the holding of exhibitions, meetings, lectures, seminars, forums, group discussions and classes; and
  - (e) promote, encourage or undertake experimental work."


#### His Excellency Mr. Paramasivum Pillay Vyapoory, G.O.S.K

#### **Decisions & Powers of the Council**

The powers of the Council are exercised by two main decision taking bodies which are distinctively clear and separate. Whilst the general assembly ("Council") is sovereign and supreme, it takes decisions as it deems it fit and proper in line with its Objects enshrined in Section 4 of the MACOSS Act 1970.

The Council may remove or suspend from office any member of the Committee for reasons spelt out under Section 12 of the MACOSS Act 1970. Decisions of the Council are final and bind Member Organisations. The Council is also the final appeal instance where a Member or person feeling aggrieved by a decision of the Executive Committee may appeal.

The general assembly of Members comprises of delegates from compliant registered non-governmental organizations (NGOs) and is chaired by the Chairman of the Council. As per the MACOSS Regulations of 2018 and read in line with the MACOSS Act 1970, the Chairman has a mandate of two consecutive years and remains in post till the next annual meeting of the Council which is held at latest 15 months after the holding of the preceding annual meeting.

The second body is the Executive Committee which derives its powers from the Council, conferred upon it by the general assembly of Members. Members of the Executive Committee, also known as the "Committee" members are elected by the general assembly of Members and remain in post for a period of up to three years. At the expiry of their mandate they are eligible to be re-elected.

The Chairman of the Council, once democratically elected by the general assembly, also becomes the *de-facto* Chairman of the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee does not elect the Chairman. The Chairman derives his powers from the Council.

The Council is totally independent and sovereign from government, institutions and/or from any other person so that it exercises its powers through its general assembly.

# **INTERNATIONAL AFFILIATIONS & COLLABORATORS**

The Council is affiliated to various international organizations which are as follows:

#### 1. International Council on Social Welfare (ICSW)

The International Council on Social Welfare (ICSW) is a non-governmental organization focusing on advocacy, knowledge-building and technical assistance projects in various areas of social development carried out at the country level and internationally.

#### 2. Africa Philanthropy Network (APN)

Established in 2009, APN was conceived as a space for African institutions to interrogate and intervene in the power dynamics that shape how resource mobilization, distribution and spending, impact the possibilities of transformative change in Africa.

#### 3. International Council of Voluntary Agencies (ICVA)

ICVA is a global network of non-governmental organisations whose mission is to make humanitarian action more principled and effective by working collectively and independently to influence policy and practice.

#### 4. FORUS International

A global network of 69 National NGO Platforms (NPF) and 7 Regional Coalitions (RC) from 5 continents. It works to strengthen the capacities of civil society to ensure the effective and efficient participation of civil society actors in official negotiations.

FORUS advocates for better resourcing of civil society and the defense of an enabling environment for civil society organisations to influence public policy at the national, regional and international level.

# 5. Southern African Development Community-Council of Non-Governmental Organisations (SADC-CNGO)

SADC CNGO is a regional umbrella body of NGOs operating in all SADC Member States. It was formed in 1998 to facilitate effective and meaningful engagement between civil society in the region and SADC institutions at national and regional levels.

#### 6. Southern Africa Trust

A non-profit organization that undertakes activities that contribute to the reduction of poverty and inequality. These include activities related to public policy, official poverty reduction processes, human rights, stakeholder engagement, human and economic development, research, training and capacity building. The Southern Africa Trust channels the voices and the vibrancy of the vulnerable through policy in the 16 SADC countries.

#### 7. African Union – AU-ECOSOCC

The Economic, Social & Cultural Council (ECOSOCC) was established in July 2004 as an advisory organ composed of different social and professional groups of AU Member States.

The purpose of ECOSOCC is to provide an opportunity for African Civil Society Organisations (CSOs) to play an active role in contributing to the AU's principles, policies and programmes.

#### 8. CIVICUS/AGNA

CIVICUS is a global alliance of civil society organisations and activists dedicated to strengthening citizen action and civil society throughout the world. The AGNA network brings together national associations and regional platforms from around the world to foster greater cooperation across national and regional boundaries, including innovating new ways for civil society organisations to collaborate.

#### 9. United Nations- Economic and Social Council

The Economic and Social Council is at the heart of the United Nations system to advance the three dimensions of sustainable development – economic, social and environmental. It is the central platform for fostering debate and innovative thinking, forging consensus on ways forward, and coordinating efforts to achieve internationally agreed goals. It is also responsible for the follow-up of major UN conferences and summits.

The UN Charter established ECOSOC in 1945 as one of the six main organs of the United Nations.

#### **10. FEMNET International**

Also known as the African Women's Development and Communication Network, it is an organization established in 1998 to promote women's development in Africa. FEMNET helps non-governmental organizations share information and approaches on women's development, equality and other human rights.


# 11. Beijing NGO Association for International Exchanges

Beijing NGO Association for International Exchanges hereinafter referred to as Beijing NGO, was established on August 2007. It is a non-profit social organization with independent legal person status and cofounded by local NGOs in various fields. The purpose of this association is to promote exchanges and cooperation between NGOs in Beijing and international NGOs through organizing an array of activities and events.

Since its establishment, Beijing NGO has sent delegations to over 76 countries and during their visits, they have attended international conferences to promote the international image of NGOs in Beijing.



They have also received over 100 delegations from different international organizations over 120 countries. These delegations participated in events like Sustainable Development and Green Olympics, The Beijing International Walking Festival, The Beijing International Forum on People to People Friendship, the Seminar of Red Cross in Beijing among others were conducted to pave way to a platform where there is facilitation of international exchanges of local NGOs and ensuring a stable development of people to people



exchanges in Beijing.

MACOSS has been linked to Beijing NGO since 2011 when a delegation from the association came to Mauritius to establish contact and the following year, MACOSS returned the invitation. Since then, there has been mutual visitations periods to persevere in maintaining this relationship.

In 2019, the relationship between MACOSS and Beijing NGO has been reinforced and it is hoped that more avenues of exchange will open between the two organisations.

The memorandum of understanding between both countries is still much present till date where both countries continue to support each other and promote goals close to their associations for a better sustainable society.

#### 12. African Peer Review Mechanism

The APRM was established on March 2003 in Abuja, Nigeria by the African Union within the framework of the implementation of the New Partnership for Africa's Development (NEPAD). The APRM is a mutually agreed instrument voluntarily acceded to by AU member States as an African self-monitoring mechanism. It is often described as "Africa's unique and innovative approach to governance" with the objective of improving governance dynamics at the local, national and continental levels.

Mauritius endorsed the APRM on July 2003 and a Country Review Mission was conducted by the APRM panel in July 2009. A National Governing Committee (NGC) was set up by the Government with representatives of key stakeholders participating in it like the Public Sector, Private Sector, Institutions / Regulatory Bodies, Civil Society and Academia. A first meeting was held on April 2018 and was presided by the Chairperson of Mauritius Council of Social Service (MACOSS).

The concept of APRM is to focus on four thematic areas which are as follows:

- Democracy and Political Governance
- Economic Governance and Management
- Corporate Governance
- Socio Economic Development

Member countries within the APRM undertake self-monitoring in all aspects of their governance and socioeconomic development. African Union (AU) stakeholders participate in the self-assessment of all branches of government; executive, legislative and judicial as well as the private sector, civil society and the media. The APRM Review Process gives member states a space for national dialogue on governance and socioeconomic indicators and an opportunity to build consensus on the way forward.

# **2019 IN RETROSPECT**

#### **PROJECTS & ACTIVITIES**

Starting year 2019, MACOSS has been engaged in a series of activities and projects with focus being on innovation, teamwork and sustainable development goals. A number of activities have been carried out together with stakeholders, namely Member Organizations, Ministries, Institutions, Private Sector Organisations, Volunteers, Academia and individuals.

#### JANUARY

#### **Brainstorming Session on Flag Days**

On 17 January 2019 at the Municipal Hall of Port Louis with Flag Holders, issues about the new system for Flag Day collect were discussed.

#### MARCH

#### Workshop on the Promotion of Respect for Human Rights in Mauritius and Rodrigues

MACOSS in collaboration with the National Human Rights Commission (NHRC) organized a half-day workshop on Friday 15 March 2019, at the MACOSS Regional Leadership Centre, Moka. The key speaker was Mr John Wadham, Chair of the UK National Preventive Mechanism and Member of the UK Independent Advisory Panel on Deaths in Custody.

#### **Brainstorming Session on CSR**

A Brainstorming Session on CSR (First Batch) was organized by MACOSS on 27 March 2019 at the Municipal Council of Port Louis. The objective of this session was to discuss about issues and the challenges encountered by NGOs to acquire CSR fund.

#### APRIL

Consultative Workshop on the Mauritius Voluntary National Review on Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)

Mauritius presented its Voluntary National Review (VNR) and reported on the progress made in implementing the Sustainable Development Goals SDGs) during the 2019 High level Political Forum (HLPF) in New York.

The Mauritius Council of Social Service (MACOSS) in collaboration with the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Regional Integration & International Trade had organized a consultative workshop on Friday 12 April 2019 at the Council Room of the City Council of Port Louis with the objective to gather inputs to consolidate the report.





# Community Learning and Engagement (CLEn) 2019 Edition

The 2019 edition of the NGO Fair in relation to the CLEN Programme was held on Friday 26 April, 2019, at the Regional Leadership Centre, Moka. 17 NGOs participated on that day where students signed up to do training sessions with NGOs.

#### MAY

#### Workshop on the Protocol to the African Charter on Human and People's Rights on the Rights

#### of Women in Africa

In the process of collecting input for the state reporting under the Protocol to the African Charter on Human and People's Rights on the Rights of Women in Africa the Ministry of Gender Equality, Child Development and Family Welfare requested MACOSS to provide input on NGOs to be included in the report. In this respect a workshop was organized on Wednesday 29 May 2019 at the Regional Leadership Centre (RLC) behind Wellkin Hospital, Moka.

The main objectives were to provide an overview of the substantive provisions of the Maputo Protocol (Protocol to the African Charter on Human and People's Rights on the Rights of Women in Africa). Also to gather input from the Civil Society Organisations to strengthen the drafting of the Government's Report.

Gender Project on Women Empowerment in Disaster Risk Reduction and Enhancing Resilience

#### against Extreme Weather

Mauritius Meteorological Services and the National Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Centre organized a joint one-day workshop on Thursday 30 May 2019 at Diamond Hall, Special Mobile Force, Vacoas.

The theme was: "Women Empowerment in Disaster Risk Reduction and Enhancing Resilience against Extreme Weather". MACOSS mobilized 35 participants to be involved in the project.



## JUNE Orientation Workshop on Partnership Project with NGOS in Mauritius



The Mauritius Council of Social Service (MACOSS) in collaboration with the Ministry of Health and Quality of Life (MOHQL) and the World Health Organization (WHO) organized two Capacity Building Workshops at Sofitel Mauritius L'Imperial Resort & Spa, Wolmar, Flic en Flac, from 19 to 21 June 2019 and 4 to 6 November 2019.

These workshops were supported by the French Government as well as a French NGO; "Santé Diabète".

The objective of the Workshop was to boost NGO's capacity to execute Logical Framework Analysis and to elaborate a Global Logical Framework across the NCD Clusters, including sections of monitoring and evaluation (M&E) and budget estimation.

#### AUGUST

Sports & Fun Day 2019

The Sports & Fun Day 2019 was organised by Mental Health Federation (Mauritius) on 30 August 2019 at Maryse Justin Stadium, Réduit.



#### **OCTOBER**

#### African Peer Review Mechanism (APRM) Technical Support Mission to Mauritius

The Continental Secretariat of the APRM conducted a Technical Support Mission to Mauritius, from 3 to 4 October 2019. The purpose was to discuss about the establishment of a national structure to support Mauritius in the APRM process and the finalization of the Mauritius Progress Report scheduled to be presented at the next African Peer Review Forum of Heads of State and Government, participating in the African Peer Review Mechanism in January 2020. In the same vein, MACOSS in collaboration with the Ministry of Foreign Affairs organized a one-day workshop on Thursday 3 October 2019, at Flying Dodo, Bagatelle and Members of the National Governing Committee were invited to this event.

#### Informative Session - Australia Awards Study and Training Opportunities

MACOSS in collaboration with the Australian High Commission organized an informative session on 17 October 2019 on Australia Awards Study and Training Opportunities. The objective was to share information to the NGOs, on opportunities that exist for them through the Australia Awards program (masters' scholarships and short courses). A presentation was made by Mr Conrad Mthokozisi Ndlovu, an officer of Palladium, the contractor of the Australia Awards program.

# Pre-Election Mission to Mauritius – Electoral Commissions Forum of SADC Countries (ECF-SADC)

The ECF-SADC undertook a pre-election visit to Mauritius from 23 to 26 October 2019. This was a solidarity visit to the Electoral Commission of Mauritius as a member commission to the Forum and to establish its preparedness for the 2019 elections, exchange of possible collaboration / support initiatives and other issues of mutual interest.

A team of three members was led by Mr. Mosotho Moepya, a Commissioner at the Independent Electoral Commission of South Africa. The team met with the Chairman of MACOSS on electoral matters on 25 October 2019.

#### Mainstreaming Civil Society Engagement into Bank Operations

The AFDB Mauritius Country Team, with the support of the AFDB Civil Society and Community Engagement Division organized in collaboration with MACOSS, a CSO Open Day on 31 October 2019 at Voila Bagatelle, under the theme, "*Bringing the Bank Closer to the People*". Representatives of Civil Society Organisations, SMEs and National Women Council participated in this event.

Five members of AFDB namely Ms. Mulindi Director Special Programmes Engagement with CSO &CBO (East and Southern Africa), Mr. George Kararach, Lead Economist, Ms. Njeri Kinyoto, Senior Civil Society Officer, Mr. Ndoli, Senior Country Economist, and Ms. Brenda Tausagae facilitated the event.

The objective of the open day was to create awareness on the Bank's operations and interventions in the country; receive feedback on the projects funded by AFDB and discuss modalities of enhancing engagement between the Bank and CSOs as key stakeholders in the achievement of the country's development goals.

# NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER, 2019

 The Isobel Foster was set up on the 10<sup>th</sup> January 1976 to provide financial assistance to relatives of late Isobel Foster, domiciled in Mauritius, who may be in need. The fund is administered by the Board of trustees nominated by the Mauritius Council of Social Service from amongst representatives of its members.

#### 2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The principal accounting policies adopted by the council are as follows:

(a) Basis of accounting

The accounts are prepared under the historical cost convention as modified by the revaluation of certain non current asset in accordance with the International Financial Reporting Standards.

(b) Recognition of Income

- Income is compromised of dividends from investment and interest from bank.
  - (c) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash comprises cash at bank and in hand, demand deposits and bank overdraft. Cash equivalents are short – term highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

(d) Taxation

No provision for taxation is required as the organisation is exempt from taxation in terms of the second schedule of the Income Tax Act (section 7)

(e) Investments

Investments in quoted shares are measured at fair value through the profit and loss. Any fair value change is directly recognised in the income and expenditure statements.
